MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Mexican asparagus is very limited until mid-May, with stronger supply expected late May–June. Peru is steady, with more volume late June–July. Ecuador air freight should ease soon, ocean shipments are slowly increasing, and quality remains fair.

Broccoli: supply is very low; weather cut yields, and prices may rise slightly next week.

Brussel Sprouts: Slightly tight; prices may rise a bit into the weekend.

Carrots: Imperial Valley supplies are tight with small sizing due to early harvests; Bakersfield reopening in 3–4 weeks should improve size and availability.

Cauliflower: Cauliflower is very tight; yields dropping and prices likely up slightly next week.

Celery: Santa Maria/Oxnard supply is light; demand exceeds supply, keeping markets tight and value-added items elevated for weeks despite good quality.

Citrus (Lemons): San Joaquin supports Oxnard/Ventura; size peaks at 115/95/140 with mostly choice fruit. Small lemons (165s+) are very tight.

Citrus (Oranges): Navels are mostly large (56/72ct); small sizes are very tight into Valencia transition. Expect substitutions to larger fruit and encourage acceptance of 72/88ct.

Lettuce (Iceberg): Strong demand vs low supply keeps market active; quality issues present. Value-added prices elevated; sourcing from Salinas, SoCal, and light Mexico volume.

Lettuce leaf: Leaf lettuce and romaine are tight with higher prices; hearts are short with smaller, lighter, slightly burned product expected for weeks.

Onions: PNW season is ending early; Texas is rain-limited; California is main source, focusing on contracts as inventory builds.

Pineapple: Pineapples are tight with rising Mother's Day demand; contracts prioritized. Large sizes improving, but crownless 8/10ct and organic remain limited.

Tomatoes: Tomatoes are very tight. Round/vine nearly unavailable in the West, Roma demand is heavy, and grape/cherry are inconsistent. Expect tight supply for weeks until new regions start.

Strawberries: Rain/cold cut yields; Mother's Day demand tightens supply. Slight weekend relief possible, but market likely stays tight next week.

CROP UPDATES

Markets are broadly tight across produce due to weather, disease, and transition gaps. Romaine, iceberg, broccoli, cauliflower, and asparagus are all reduced in yield and supply, keeping prices elevated. Tomatoes remain especially tight (rounds worst), with only gradual relief expected as Florida ramps and Mexico slowly recovers; grapes/cherries are improving. Light rain further cut production, and Mother's Day demand is adding pressure. Expect continued tightness through at least mid–late May with limited flexibility. [Read more](#)

WEATHER

California: Warming through week under high pressure, peaking Friday (highs mid-60s–low 90s) before a Sunday system cools things back to near normal with a deeper marine layer. Lows range from 30s–50s, highs from 60s–90s.

Mexico: Warm, steady temps with isolated light showers (trace–0.20"). Highs low 80s–low 90s, lows upper 50s–mid 60s through weekend.

Florida: Warm through Saturday, then a cold front brings cooler, wetter weather Sunday with about 0.5–1.0" rain expected over much of Florida.

Arizona: Low over N. Baja keeps most rain south; Scottsdale has slight Wed night–Thu rain chance, otherwise dry. Highs mid-80s–90s (warming into 90s Fri), lows mid-50s rising to mid-60s. Thermal near 100s.

FREIGHT

Freight this week continues to see shipper delays due to slower harvest times, and leftover effect of rain from last week. We are still expecting the freight market to be affected by these delays and will likely continue into May

Apples

The market remains steady overall. Supplies are seasonally declining and are expected to come into balance with softer demand in May. As schools break for summer, pricing should remain close to current levels. Retail bag programs continue to absorb a significant portion of smaller fruit, requiring foodservice customers to adapt by utilizing alternative sizes. Availability of 100-count and smaller fruit remains tight across Cosmic Crisp, Honeycrisp, Pink Lady, and Gala, a trend expected to persist through the end of the season until the arrival of the new crop.

Asparagus



Mexican asparagus is very limited as Sonora ends harvest and Baja ramps up too late for Mother's Day, with improvement expected by mid May and more volume from Central Mexico in late May into June. Peruvian supply is steady with limited near term growth as production shifts north, with better volume in late June and July, while tight air freight from Ecuador is expected to ease soon; quality remains fair with some issues, and ocean shipments are increasing slowly with modest short term relief.

ALERT

The Imperial Valley is currently the main growing region, with availability expected to improve in the next 3-4 weeks as Bakersfield comes back online, weather permitting. Shippers entered Imperial Valley fields earlier than ideal due to limited supply from Bakersfield, resulting in smaller sizing and putting growers in a difficult position, which has led to a slowdown in harvests to allow product to size up properly. While the carrot market was already under pressure, continued harvesting at reduced sizing would have further strained the industry. Over the next few weeks, sizing should improve along with stronger overall availability.

In this coastal production area, sizing is peaking on 115s, 95s, and 140s, with approximately 70% choice and 30% fancy due to growing conditions. Markets remain extremely tight on 165s and smaller lemons.

Citrus (Limes)

The lime market is easing after months of high prices, with further stabilization expected in the coming weeks and a larger drop likely after Cinco de Mayo. Quality and shelf life are good as new crop comes online. Small sizes (230s/200s) are peaking and offer the best value, while larger sizes (110s/150s) will remain tight into early summer. Colombia and Peru are expected to exit by late May due to unfavorable market conditions.

The California Navel crop is heavily skewed toward larger sizes, peaking on 56ct and 72ct fruit. Small sizes (113ct and 138ct) are very limited and expected to stay tight through the rest of the Navel season and into the Valencia transition, which may begin in the next few weeks. Flexibility on size will be necessary, with substitutions into larger fruit likely as suppliers maintain contract averages. Please communicate these sizing constraints to schools and DOD programs and encourage acceptance of 88ct or 72ct fruit.

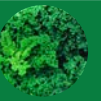

Common quality issues include outer leaf discoloration, lighter weights, and misshapen heads. Value-added items will remain elevated across all processors. Production is currently coming out of the Salinas Valley and Southern California, with Mexico contributing light volumes as well.

ALERT

The pineapple market is steady but remains tight due to earlier rainfall and planting gaps. With Mother's Day approaching, demand is expected to increase, keeping conditions tight. Contract orders continue to receive priority. Larger sizes (6 and 7 count with crowns) are becoming more available, while 8 count crowned fruit remains steady. Crownless 8 and 10 count sizes are still limited, and organic pineapples continue to be in short supply.

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Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

Temperatures will steadily warm through the rest of the week as high pressure strengthens. Wednesday morning lows will range from the mid-30s to low 40s south of King City and the low to upper 40s elsewhere, with daytime highs in the mid-60s to low 80s. Conditions peak on Friday, with lows in the low 40s to mid-50s and highs reaching the mid-60s to low 90s. A weak system moves in Sunday, deepening the marine layer and bringing temperatures back closer to seasonal norms.



MEXICO

Warm temperatures are expected with only minor day-to-day changes across most areas. Shower activity will remain isolated, with rainfall amounts generally ranging from a trace to 0.20". Highs will run in the low 80s to low 90s, with lows in the upper 50s to mid 60s through the weekend.



FLORIDA

Warm temps into Saturday. By late Saturday into Sunday cooler and wetter weather is more likely to overtake the state as a cold front pushes southward into the area. Early rainfall estimates are averaging near 0.50" to 1.00" for a good portion of the Florida peninsula.



ARIZONA

Models are showing good consistency with an approaching low-pressure system moving into northern Baja, directing most moisture south of the forecast area into north Sonora. A small chance of light rain exists near Scottsdale Wednesday night into Thursday afternoon, otherwise dry conditions are expected through the weekend. Highs will range from the mid-80s to low 90s Wednesday and Thursday, warming into the 90s by Friday with lows near 100s around Thermal. Morning lows will also trend warmer, rising from the mid to upper 50s Wednesday into the mid to upper 60s by Sunday.

Crop Updates



Markets Stay Tight as Pressure Builds

There's a lot moving right now, and not much of it is easing up.

Romaine is starting to tighten in Salinas. Growth has been slow, and both field pack and processed supplies are coming in lighter than expected. On top of that, we're seeing demand shift out of iceberg and into romaine, which is adding pressure. Seeder is still an issue and will continue to limit yields over the next couple of weeks.

Iceberg isn't giving us much relief either.

Fields are dealing with Sclerotinia, which is cutting yields and tightening supply. Processors are also stepping into the open market to cover shorts, which is pulling product away from the fresh side and keeping things volatile.

Broccoli and cauliflower are in the same boat. Cooler weather and recent rain slowed things down, and harvests haven't caught back up yet. Yields are lighter, demand is steady, and markets are staying elevated.

Even the light rain over the weekend had an impact.

Salinas, Watsonville, Santa Maria, and Oxnard all saw some moisture. Not a big storm, but enough to slow crews down. When that happens, harvest gets more selective, and yields drop. We're expecting 10–15% less production short term, and with cooler weather this week, things aren't going to bounce back right away.

If there's a slight advantage anywhere, Santa Maria has a little more availability than other regions, but still below normal.



Crop Updates



Asparagus is still extremely tight.

Sonora is wrapping up, Baja is just getting started, and it's not nearly enough to cover near-term demand, especially with Mother's Day coming. Domestic production is late, and frost hasn't helped. Peru is filling in, but quality has been hit or miss and freight is tight.

Bottom line, not much relief here until mid- to late May.

Tomatoes continue to be one of the toughest spots in the market, especially rounds.

Mexico remains extremely tight on round tomatoes due to recent weather and reduced acreage, keeping prices elevated. Florida is starting to help, with Central production getting underway and expected to build this week, while South Florida winds down. That should bring some gradual relief, but not immediately.

Romas are tightening as well, especially out of Florida as growers move into later picks. Demand has picked up as buyers look for substitutes for rounds, keeping markets firm. Mexico remains limited, though new production out of Jalisco and Baja is starting to come online and should build over the next few weeks.

Grape and cherry are the only ones showing some improvement. Florida and Baja are adding volume, quality is good, and markets have started to ease. That trend should continue into May.

With Mother's Day around the corner, the Central Coast is basically one weather event away from getting even tighter.

We've got weather, disease pressure, and transition gaps all hitting at once. Supply is tight, markets are elevated, and flexibility is going to matter over the next few weeks.
