

MARKET ALERTS

Strawberries: Cool temps and cloud cover are slowing production in Santa Maria and Salinas/Watsonville. Many shippers are sold out, with late orders pushed to Monday. Smaller berry sizing is also cutting yields.

Broccoli: Broccoli supplies are tight as Diamondback moths damage Salinas Valley crops. Some fields are lost, and the market is expected to rise into next week.

Citrus (Lemons): Markets remain strong, with 165ct and smaller sizes tighter. District 2 (Oxnard) is now the main region as District 1 is done. Offshore is delayed 3 weeks, and Mexico starts mid-July. Domestic supplies are tight, with heavy pressure on District 2's mostly choice-grade crop.

Cauliflower: Supplies are tightening as storms in Mexico boost demand on Salinas and Santa Maria. Market prices are expected to rise into next week.

Blackberries: Quality issues in Central Mexico are affecting arrivals. California's delayed season starts next week with low initial volumes. Georgia remains a reliable East Coast option.

Brussel Sprouts: Supplies are tight due to weather and Hurricane Erick in Mexico. Demand is shifting to limited Oxnard supplies, with Salinas not starting until late July.

Lettuce (iceberg): The market has surged due to weather-related shortages in Mexico, the Midwest, and East Coast. Salinas and Southern CA can't meet demand. Value-added prices may rise, with carton weights averaging 35–40 lbs.

Lettuce Leaf: Demand is up for romaine and leaf lettuce. Romaine hearts are tight with rising contract prices. Supplies are light to moderate, with some quality issues due to weather.

Lettuce Tender Leaf: Tender leaf supplies like cilantro, spinach, and arugula are tight due to weather-related yellowing. Limited supply expected into next week.

A new tropical system is expected off Southern Mexico, adding to recent storm damage and harvest delays. Extreme heat in the U.S. is stressing crops. WEATHER

California: High pressure builds Wednesday, bringing near to above-average temps through the weekend. Morning lows range from low 40s to mid 50s; daytime highs reach low 60s to low 70s near the coast, upper 70s to mid 80s in coastal valleys, and upper 80s to mid 90s south of Soledad.

Mexico: Isolated to scattered showers and storms expected through Sunday, with rainfall mostly 0.10"–0.35", and up to 0.50"+ in some storms. Temps will be slightly below normal, warming late week.

Florida: Warm temps continue through the week, then cool slightly with more humidity and showers over the weekend. Showers isolated to scattered Thursday, becoming more widespread Friday-Sunday.

Arizona: Low desert valleys will slowly warm into the weekend under high pressure. Arizona highs rise from upper 90s–102°F Tuesday to 104–109°F Saturday. Imperial and Coachella Valleys warm from upper 90s–105°F Tuesday to 108–113°F Friday. Morning lows increase from mid-60s Tuesday to mid-70s Friday.

Avocados

Markets remain steady across the board. Larger fruit continues to command a premium over 48ct and smaller sizes. There are roughly two weeks left of the current Normal crop, with Flora Loca set to follow. The current size peak is on 60/70ct, but with the rainy season underway, sizing is expected to increase. While nothing is confirmed yet, peak sizing may shift into the 48/60ct range by the time harvest begins. Meanwhile, the California season is beginning to slow, and offshore fruit is now arriving on both coasts.



Georgia's season is winding down, with most growers finishing soon. New supply is expected from the Northeast and Midwest. Limited colored pepper supply from Canada and Mexico has shifted demand to California, pushing prices up during the Coachella-to-Bakersfield transition.

Quality issues continue to impact transferred fruit out of Central Mexico, affecting arrivals. The California season is running late due to cold weather and persistent cloud cover, with production expected to begin next week. Initial volumes will be limited, gradually increasing as we move into early July. Georgia product remains a reliable loading option for the East Coast.

ALERT

Markets remain strong, with 165ct and smaller sizes slightly tighter. District 1 (San Joaquin Valley) has finished, and District 2 (Ventura County/Oxnard) is now the primary growing region. Offshore arrivals are delayed by about three weeks, while Mexico is projected to start mid-July. As a result, domestic supplies have tightened rapidly, putting significant pressure on California's District 2 crop, which typically yields more choice-grade fruit.

Gas times are running 24-48 hours to enhance color, and brix levels are ranging from 11 to 13, with the fruit eating exceptionally well.



CALIFORNIA

High pressure strengthens Wednesday, bringing near to above-average temperatures through the weekend. Morning lows will range from the low 40s to mid-50s, with daytime highs in the low 60s to low 70s near the coast, upper 70s to mid-80s in the coastal valleys, and upper 80s to mid-90s south of Soledad.



MEXICO

Expect isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms through Thursday, with additional isolated showers and storms from Friday through Sunday. Rainfall totals will generally range from 0.10" to 0.35", though some thunderstorms—especially on Thursday—could bring 0.50" or more. Temperatures will average a few degrees below normal over the next five days, warming slightly toward the end of the week.



FLORIDA

Warm temperatures will persist through the end of the week, then cool slightly over the weekend amid increased humidity and shower activity. Showers will be isolated to scattered through Thursday, becoming more widespread from Friday through Sunday as an upper-level disturbance passes and moisture levels rise in the region.



ARIZONA

The low desert valleys will experience gradual warming into the weekend under stationary high pressure and light southerly winds. Arizona highs are expected to range from the upper 90s to 102°F on Tuesday, rising to 104–109°F by Saturday afternoon. Imperial and Coachella Valleys will see highs in the upper 90s to 105°F on Tuesday, warming to 108–113°F by Friday. Morning lows will increase from the mid to upper 60s on Tuesday to the mid 70s by Friday.

Tropical activity continues in the Eastern Pacific following hurricane Erick last week as another tropical system is expected to form off the coast of Southern Mexico later this week. NOAA reports "Environmental conditions are conducive for gradual development and a tropical depression is likely to form over the weekend". These regions have already received significant precipitation and hail from previous tropical systems with extensive damage reported in some iceberg, romaine and broccoli fields. Numerous crops are likely to be impacted and with more heavy rain on the way, yields and quality will suffer. Growers are having a problem getting equipment into the saturated fields for harvesting activities severely impacting production for the near term. It will take some time for growers to conduct crop assessments following these storms.

Regional production is gaining momentum across the country; however very hot temperatures are forecast as a very strong upper ridge remains centered over the middle half of the country. Extensive extreme heat warnings and/or heat advisories remain in affect from the entire East Coast to Georgia as well as along the Mississippi Valley.

With the anticipated lighter production from Mexico and the heat impacting local production out east demand for California supplies is on the rise causing some product shortages especially in the lettuce and romaine supplies.

At this point Mother Nature is in charge with upcoming weather patterns crucial to overall supplies and quality from the various growing regions. We will be watching the weather patterns to keep you up to date as to the potential impacts on the various crops and growing regions as reports become available.
