

MARKET ALERTS


Brussels Sprouts: The sprout market remains active with supplies below normal and strong demand. Open market prices are rising and are expected to continue increasing for the next 2-3 weeks.

Citrus (Lemons): Markets are firming as rain has boosted fruit size. 140ct and smaller sizes are tightening, with limited small fruit until District 2 increases volume in June. District 1 is the main growing region, while District 2 contributes minimal volume.

Citrus (Oranges): Markets remain strong as the Navel season winds down, set to end in June. Small fruit will stay limited, and suppliers are managing volumes while delaying Valencia shipments to ensure fall supply. Valencia harvest is expected to begin in early June.

Pineapple: Pineapple supply is tight due to high demand and vessel delays, causing shorts and order cuts. Crownless pineapples are particularly limited. Tight supplies are expected through the week, with improvement in the coming weeks.

Spring's temperature swings are slowing crop growth and increasing disease pressure in coastal California. Artichokes, Brussels sprouts, and green beans are all facing light supplies due to weather, disease, and regional transitions. Read more

WEATHER

California: The warming trend continues today with highs in the 60s to 80s. Temperatures will range from mid 60s to mid 70s along the coast and low 80s to upper 90s inland through the week. A cooling trend will begin by Sunday.

Mexico: Warm temperatures will continue through Thursday with mostly dry conditions. Cooler temps and scattered showers are expected later in the week, with rainfall between 0.05" to 0.20". Highs will be in the mid 80s to mid 90s through Thursday, cooling to normal levels Friday to Sunday with lows in the mid 50s to mid 60s.

Florida: Unsettled weather in Florida will bring heavier rains later in the week. Highs will be in the mid 80s to low 90s through Thursday, cooling to the low 80s to upper 80s from Friday to Sunday. Lows will range from the mid 60s to mid 70s through the weekend.

Arizona: Scattered showers will continue in central Arizona, with dry, warmer conditions elsewhere. Highs will range from mid 80s to 112°F by Saturday, with morning lows in the upper 50s to mid 70s. Winds will remain light and northerly.

FREIGHT

Truck market is active with Mother's day approaching. Primary US growing regions are seeing an increase in demand for trucks for this reason, as well as warmer temps, as summer approaches. Expect a continued, upward trend of truck demand through July 4th as we navigate Memorial Day.



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Apples

The apple market remains stable on the surface, but pressure is building. Most core varieties - Red Delicious, Gala, Fuji, Granny Smith - are holding steady, with ample foodservice sizes available. However, Cosmic Crisp and Honeycrisp are showing volatility. A surplus of oversized Cosmics has flooded the market, while smaller sizes are scarce. Honeycrisp, meanwhile, is down 35% amid tight supply and soaring prices. Market conditions are shifting - and fast.

<u>Asparagus</u>

Asparagus supplies are improving. Peru continues to increase volume, pushing prices down from recent highs. Mexican production is ramping up slowly in Baja as Caborca winds down. U.S. harvest has begun in Washington, with Michigan expected to start mid-May. Expect a continued downward trend in the market next week.

<u>Avocados</u>

Markets are beginning to ease as offshore volumes increase on both coasts. Supplies of 48ct and smaller fruit have improved, while larger sizes remain tight. The Normal crop has about 6-8 weeks remaining before the Flora Loca crop begins. Meanwhile, the California season is in full swing.

Pears

Domestic pear supplies are critically low and unlikely to improve before mid-July, when California's Bartlett crop is expected to begin — weather and conditions permitting. Washington's output has been severely impacted, down 25–50% depending on the region. Bosc supplies are nearly gone, leaving Anjou as the primary domestic option. Meanwhile, imported pears are arriving on both coasts, offering reliable volume for buyers less concerned with origin.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

The warming trend continues today as high pressure strengthens, easing marine layer conditions. Morning lows will range from the upper 30s to low 50s, with daytime highs reaching the low 60s to low 70s along the coast and low 70s to mid 80s inland. For the rest of the week, maximum temperatures will range from the mid 60s to mid 70s near the coast and low 80s to upper 90s inland. By Sunday, an approaching low will initiate a cooling trend.



MEXICO

Warm temperatures will persist through Thursday with mostly dry conditions. Slightly cooler temps and a chance for isolated to scattered showers will develop later in the week, with rainfall ranging from 0.05" to 0.20", and higher totals possible in thunderstorms.

Highs will reach the mid 80s to mid 90s through Thursday. From Friday to Sunday, temperatures will cool slightly, approaching normal levels, with showers limiting daytime heating in some areas. Lows will be in the mid 50s to mid 60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Unsettled weather is expected over the Florida peninsula, with heavier rains possible later in the week. Temperatures will cool slightly as clouds and showers limit daytime heating. Highs will be in the mid 80s to low 90s through Thursday, then drop to the low 80s to upper 80s from Friday through Sunday. Lows will range from the mid 60s to mid 70s most mornings through the weekend.



ARIZONA

Scattered showers will continue across central Arizona this afternoon, but dry conditions and a warming trend are expected elsewhere. Highs will range from the mid to upper 80s in most valleys, reaching 100-107°F by Friday afternoon, and peaking Saturday at 100-107°F in Arizona and 105-112°F in southeast California. Morning lows will be in the upper 50s to low 60s on Wednesday, warming to the low to mid 70s by Saturday, with mid 70s expected in most valleys on Sunday. Winds will remain light and northerly throughout the weekend.



Grop Updates

The roller coaster of temperatures, typical of spring, looks likely to continue across the coastal California fields as we move through May. As low pressure systems pass mainly to the north, they bring cooler temperatures along with a heavy marine layer and drizzle to the fields. Intermittent high pressure then brings warm temperatures and a shallow marine layer for a short period followed by another round of cooler temperatures, fog and drizzle. The cooler temperatures will slow growth rates while increasing mold, mildew and disease pressure in these stands. Some of the mature lettuce and leaf stands are showing some disease pressure producing lighter yields in upcoming stands. Of particular concern now are supplies of artichokes, brussels sprouts and green beans.



Artichoke production looks to remain on the light side as growers transition to Salinas Valley fields. The cool moist weather in these coastal fields has hampered production with mold and mildew impacting yields in the stands.



Green bean production from Mexico is winding down over the next couple of weeks with questionable quality and light volume. As south Florida winds down seasonally Northern Florida and Georgia are expected to add to the mix this week gradually increasing production. California desert production is expected to bring better supplies as harvests begin around mid-May.
