

#### **MARKET ALERTS**

<u>Asparagus</u> - Mexico production declines; markets highly active until Peru ramps up production.

<u>Avocado</u> - Prices rise as growers delay harvests due to higher dry matter and shorter ripening times.

<u>Blackberries</u> - Shippers expected to remain short in May, but supplies are improving in CMEX and Baia.

<u>Blueberries</u> - Supplies rise in Mexico, Baja, and Peru, but offloads decrease in Peru.

<u>Raspberries</u> - CMEX and Baja shortages improving; shippers to remain short by month's end.

<u>Strawberries</u> - In Oxnard and Santa Maria, rain reduces yields, Salinas and Watsonville harvests are light, Dover, FL season ends.

<u>Broccoli</u> - With lower yields and rains in the Salinas Valley, supplies are tight.

<u>Brussel Sprouts</u>- Supply is unstable due to Easter holiday labor and border schedules.

<u>Lemons</u> - The main growing region is District 1. Sizes smaller than 140ct are extremely limited

<u>Oranges</u> - Peaking at 72ct and larger, scarce at 88/113/138ct due to low set and rain; orders flexible.

<u>Garlic</u> - The market tight despite fruitful Argentinian harvest.

#### **APRIL 10, 2024**

#### **CROP UPDATES**

A cold low-pressure system from the Gulf of Alaska is expected to enter California on Friday, bringing light to moderate rain and strong winds of 20-35mph. This is expected to be the last winter storm system of the season. Read more

#### **WEATHER**

Arizona - Southerly winds will increase to 30-38mph on Friday, causing temperatures in low deserts to be 10-15 degrees above normal. Lows will be in the 40s-mid 50s, with maximums reaching 80s-90s on Wednesday and low-mid 90s on Thursday.

<u>California</u> - High pressure strengthens, causing temperatures to rise. Lows in King City range from mid-30s to low 40s, while near the coast, highs range from 60s to 70s. Friday will see rapid cooling and rain from 1/4" to 3/4".

Florida - Wednesday was warm and dry, with increased chances of showers and t-storms. Rainfall is possible in northern Florida to the Georgia border, with gusts ranging from 35 to 45 mph. Friday and Saturday are drier and cooler, while Sunday is warmer.

<u>Mexico</u> - During the latter half of the week and weekend, Central Mexico's growing areas will experience warm temperatures, with maximums in the low-upper 80s and mid-80s, and mostly dry weather through Sunday.

#### **FREIGHT**

Freight this week is divided between Yuma and Salinas regions in the US West, with Salinas going online full time on 4/15, and South Texas loading being cautious due to delayed Mexican crossings.



#### **MARKET ALERTS**

Red/Green Grapes - Inconsistent vessel arrivals keep market active; despite shortages and pre-commitment volumes, prices remain high.

**Green Onions** - Mildew issues and lower yields reduced availability; market expected to remain strong.

<u>Watermelon</u> - Limited Florida availability and weather delays restrict distribution.

Onions - Yellows better than reds in Oregon/Parma, Idaho; South Texas supplies improve, but prices remain high.

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#### **Apples**

In April and May, you can expect good supplies of most apple varieties. Gala and Gold Delicious are notable exceptions. As shippers reach the end of their storage deal, gold volumes have started to decline. Galas have more storage tonnage to go and are a very popular variety with consistent demand. We should have galas until the new crop but they will remain tight.

#### <u>Avocados</u>

ALERT

For 60ct and 70ct sizes, triggers are in effect. Markets are steady at higher levels, but poised to rise again when the Cinco De Mayo pull comes into effect. Peru is just around the corner, with fruit expected to arrive in volume in late-May/early-June. The Peruvian fruit coming into the US is expected to peak at 60/70ct; this is not normal for Peruvian fruit. Due to the higher dry matter content in Mexican fruit, ripening times remain short. Because of lower dry matter, California fruit is coming online in a light way and ripening time is longer. There will be fewer fruits than last year, and larger fruits will peak.



### Weather Updates



#### **CALIFORNIA**

As high pressure continues to strengthen, temperatures continue to rise. South of King City, lows will be in the mid 30s to low 40s, while elsewhere they will be in the low 40s to mid 50s. Near the coast, daytime highs will be in the low 60s to low 70s, while further inland, they will range from the mid 70s to the upper 80s. The temperature will cool rapidly Friday ahead of the next low pressure system, with maximum temps only in the low 60s to low 70s. Throughout the weekend, rain is expected to fall in the range of 1/4" - 3/4" in total.



#### **MEXICO**

As we move through the latter half of the week and into the weekend, temperatures should warm. The growing areas of Central Mexico experienced maximum temperatures in the low-upper 80s through Friday and mid-80s to low 90s over the weekend. Low temperatures will drop into the upper 40s to upper 50s through Friday morning, then into the low 50s to low 60s on Saturday and Sunday. Mostly dry weather through Sunday, except for an isolated shower or two.



#### **FLORIDA**

Wednesday was warm and dry during the day. The chances of showers and t-storms increase by late Wednesday and become more likely on Thursday. Throughout much of northern Florida to the Georgia border, 0.50" to 1.00" of rain is possible, 0.20" to 0.50" in central Florida, and 0.05" to 0.15" in southern Florida into early Friday. Some t-storms may produce higher totals. There will also be strong gusty winds on Thursday, with gusts ranging from 35 to 45 mph in some t-storms and during the frontal passage. Friday and Saturday will be drier and cooler, and Sunday will be warmer.



#### **ARIZONA**

By Friday, when southerly winds increase to gusts of 30-38mph ahead of the next cold low-pressure system, temperatures in the low deserts will be 10-15 degrees above normal. Wednesday morning lows will be in the upper 40s-mid 50s in most valleys, rising to the 50s-low 60s by Friday morning. The maximum temperatures will reach the upper 80s to mid 90s on Wednesday before rising to the low-mid 90s on Thursday. By Sunday afternoon, highs will be in the mid 70s to mid 80s.

### Freight Updates

Freight this week remains split between two regions in the US West between Yuma and Salinas. Salinas goes online full time on Monday 4/15. Caution in loading in South Texas as Mexican crossings seem to be taking longer to arrive than in weeks past.

# G Prop Update

A cold low-pressure system generated from the Gulf of Alaska moves into California Friday with light to moderate rain expected across the state. Overall precipitation is forecast to be between ½" - ¾" into Sunday. This system will also bring very strong winds of 20-35mph throughout California and the Southwestern Desert regions. This looks to be the last winter type storm system of the season.

Growers in the Southwestern Desert region will quickly wrap up production this week with limited supplies next week. Quality remains generally fairly good as growers trim out defects. However, insect pressure continues to be a problem in these late fields. These late season supplies will also continue to show some premature pinking along the ribs not seen during harvest and tends to show up during storage.

The timing of this latest system will not help growers as they continue the transition from the desert regions to the coastal valleys (Oxnard, Santa Maria, Salinas) of California. Crops in these coastal valleys were planted back in January and have seen substantial rain and cool temperatures throughout the growth cycle impacting growth rates. The leafy green fields, planted back in January, have also seen fluctuating temperatures throughout the growth cycle. Temperature variations can lead to physiological changes in lettuce plants and disrupt the developmental process impacting quality and shelf life. Early production is showing generally good quality with smaller head sizes and density contributing to lighter carton weights. Romaine and Romaine heart stands are showing darker outer leaves with little heart material currently. These leaves are prone to bruising and mechanical damage especially when processed. Some mildew stain and fringe or tip burn are also being reported in these early harvests. Planted acreage is consistent with historical averages with rains causing some planting gaps with various shippers, however no major supply shortages are expected.

Processed items will likely see an increase in bruising, discoloration and breakdown showing up in the bag affecting quality and shelf life. It remains very important to keep your rotations in check as the overall quality and shelf life of most crops, especially processed items, will be challenged.





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
